To whom it May Concern,

Although I am now retired, I am very pleased to write this letter of recommendation for Mr. Jesse Nolan. I was the District 29 Superintendent of Schools in 2009 when Mr. Nolan was hired to instruct orchestra students at Sunset Ridge School. I knew I was taking a chance hiring a percussionist to teach violin and cello, but Mr. Nolan far exceeded my expectations for the strings program and went on to transform our entire music curriculum into the impressive program it is today.

At the time when he was hired, the orchestra program consisted of a very small number of string students who played along with the school band. Mr. Nolan was given the challenge to "grow the program." In three short years the number of students playing string instruments more than tripled, the skill of individual students increased, and the level and complexity of musical selections expanded. Mr. Nolan not only "grew the program," but he transformed it into an outstanding orchestra, rivaling any other 4th though 8th grade string program in a larger district.

During this time, Mr. Nolan also contributed in many other ways to the District. He taught a junior high exploratory class on the history and commercial production of music, and worked with the band director, teaching student lessons and assisting with jazz band. He also created and led an after school "Bucket Band". This exciting program was open to all students, and gave those not in the band or orchestra an opportunity to experience the joy and fun of being part of a unique musical group.

Mr. Nolan also directed the annual school musical for four years. Under his skillful direction the musical grew into an outstanding showcase of student singing, dancing and acting. His most recent productions of *Beauty and the Beast*, *Jr*. and *Fame*, *Jr*. drew accolades and rave reviews from parents, staff and students.

Although Mr. Nolan is an accomplished professional percussionist, his true gift as an educator is his ability to interact with and relate to students. He not only taught them how to play musical instruments, but more importantly, he shared the joy of playing an instrument and helped them realize that being part of a musical group is fun--- even "cool." Mr. Nolan is an excellent role model for students. They perceive him as friendly and approachable, but they still respect his authority as the teacher.

A highlight from Mr. Nolan's tenure in the District was the music department's first ever Disney World fieldtrip, which he envisioned, championed, organized and led. Mr. Nolan oversaw every

detail of the trip, including fundraising activities, transportation arrangements, student room assignments, safety procedures and Disney clinics. The trip was a considered a huge success by parents, staff, and most importantly the students.

In addition to his work with students, Mr. Nolan created a parent organization and initiated a newsletter for the parents of music students. He also created online student practice logs and redesigned the music department web site. He garnered strong support and praise from the parents within the community and earned their respect, admiration and trust. This was an impressive accomplishment, especially given the high expectations held by the local community.

Mr. Nolan has expressed interest in pursuing a doctoral degree. I highly recommend him as a doctoral candidate. He would be a serious, conscientious, and dedicated doctoral student. I am confident he would put forth the same energy, enthusiasm, and passion for learning that he demonstrated while teaching at Sunset Ridge.

Mr. Nolan also possesses the skills necessary to be an extremely effective college instructor in a music program. While he is a talented musician, has a very strong work ethic and demonstrates good organizational skills, it is Mr. Nolan's professional work with Sunset Ridge, Blue Man Group and MashPlant that sets him apart from others. His experiences performing and teaching have given him an authentic perspective that would enhance his role as a college professor. From day one I felt as if he had always been a part of our team. I have worked with many colleagues since 1976, but none have connected with both students and faculty as well as he did.

Jesse is the consummate professional. He brings a multitude of skills to the table that few individuals can match. Not only does he have the pedagogical skills necessary to teach strings, winds and percussion, but he also has a highly advanced set of technology skills. I am writing to offer my recommendation of Jesse Nolan for an academic position with your esteemed institution. I do so with the confidence of someone who has worked with Jesse and observed his skills across a range of occupational experiences, from educator to artist, entrepreneur to executive. And in all instances, he brings a level of talent, commitment and passion that is both inspirational, and aspirational.

I feel a kinship with Jesse, having begun my career in the theater with the founding of Chicago's Apollo Theater. As a producer of theater, film and television for thirty-five years, I've worked with some of the finest creative and performing artists in the world, and Jesse Nolan is world class. An exceptionally talented musician, composer and arranger, he possesses the collaborative instincts of an ensemble member, and the vision to lead the band.

A few years ago, I focused my entrepreneurial creativity on education technology and founded MashPlant.com, a website for middle school kids who are passionate about the entertainment arts. I saw his students go from being hesitant and disinterested, to engaged and confident. Indeed, his teaching skills were so impressive, he was featured in an early news piece about MashPlant Studio on CBS-2 Morning News.

During our development, Jesse deftly balanced his teaching responsibilities with his work with MashPlant. And when MashPlant Studio debuted in 2013, Jesse officially joined our team as Director of Education and Business Development. Since then, MashPlant has spread to over 350 classrooms, worldwide, and with Jesse's entrepreneurial leadership and creative

oversight, has created exclusive classroom content in partnership with Peabody Award winner Bill McGlaughlin ("Exploring Music"), the Jazz Entertainment Network (JEN) and Chicago's Redmoon Theater (Great Chicago Fire Festival 2014).

Unfortunately, like many multi-talented people, Jesse can sometimes end up with too much on his plate. However, how someone deals with the stress of multiple

I have had the honor and privilege to work along side Jesse as a colleague for two years while employed at Sunset Ridge School as the General Music Teacher, Choral Director and Musical Director. I have known Jesse Nolan for 2 years, professionally and personally. I'm proud to have the opportunity to write a recommendation letter on his behalf. I'm happy to count Jesse among my friends as well as one of my children's mentors.

In the Marching Band, Mr. Nolan was one of two secondary instructors who worked under a primary staff member (caption head) in the percussion section. Mr. Nolan was a collaborative team player and the students and staff connected with him very well. He will, in fact, take over as the Percussion Caption Head this upcoming season, when the person formerly in that position moves-on. I have no reservations about this change in stature and the students are looking forward to it.

As the director of the entry-level Jazz Band and Combo Program, Mr. Nolan was the sole director responsible for the development of three extracurricular jazz groups. Jazz is, without question, Mr. Nolan's passion. It should be said that he started out very "green" but really grew into the position. His enthusiasm has infused our younger jazz groups with a competency in various jazz styles and given them a very strong foundation in improvisation, stronger, in fact, than I could have given them. Mr. Nolan's ensembles play not only intelligently, but they also play enthusiastically. I am pleased with the fact that Mr. Nolan has been able to accomplish this with my students.

I have known Mr. Nolan for eight years. When I first met him, he was "Jesse"; a senior in the band program that I took over in 1999 at another high school. We began our relationship as student/teacher and we have become colleagues/friends. But after reflection, the more things change, the more they stay the same. When I first knew him, he was the Marching Band drumline section leader and the lead drummer in the Jazz Ensemble. Over the years, I have had the chance to monitor his career and watch him grow. Of all my students who have gone into music, I believe that *Jesse is the most natural and gifted teacher*. It is very fulfilling for me to see him excel so much with my own current students – bringing everything full circle for us. What Mr. Nolan lacks in formal years of full-time experience, he more than makes up for in passion, desire, and an innate gift for connecting with kids. My students have stated that Mr. Nolan "makes the serious/hard work fun and we get a lot done. We play better after we work with him." This is high praise from high school students. I am very proud of him and endorse his application fully.

He was among the most intriguing group of students that I have taught. He has an unusual combination of talent, enthusiasm, and intellect. He questions, challenges and takes full responsibility and effort for his learning. Regarding his musical skills as a jazz musician, he begun playing jazz drum set at the age of two years old. He not only has been playing jazz for 17 years, but also has studied and developed an understanding of the history of Jazz music and the culture from which it sprang.
